A Brief History of the Coast Guard

Did you know that Massachusetts is the birthplace of the Coast Guard? America's oldest seagoing service has an exceptionally rich history, and Greg Ketchen, USCG, retired, will share it with us virtually via Zoom on Tuesday, April 16 at 1:00 p.m. The U.S. Lighthouse Establishment, U.S. Lifesaving Service, Bureau of Marine Inspection and Navigation, and the U.S. Revenue Cutter Service were all predecessors to today's modern Coast Guard, and this federal service has evolved into an organization with dozens of missions, some of which may surprise. Most are aware of the role of Coast Guard men and women as first responders, law enforcement officers, and boating safety experts, but few know that some are oceanographers, combat veterans, arctic explorers, and even astronauts. This program is presented in conjunction with Ashland (Mass.) Public Library.



Greg Ketchen lives in Osterville, Mass., where he is a volunteer at the Coast Guard Heritage Museum located in Barnstable's Old Customs House and has served as its president for the past six years. Before moving to the Cape 13 years ago, Greg's career included providing support to Massachusetts' commercial ports as a development consultant, heading operations at the New England Aquarium, and filling a wide variety of Coast Guard jobs. He is a frequent lecturer on a variety of topics related to Coast Guard missions and history.


Late in Arriving: How Electricity Changed Rural N.H. Life

Imagine a New Hampshire town where some people enjoyed the benefits of electricity - lighting at the flick of a switch and reliable heating controlled by a thermostat - while others lived with smelly kerosene lamps and smoky box stoves. Join us on Tuesday, April 23 at 6:00 p.m., when Steve Taylor shares the story of when electricity first came to our state in his program, "Late in Arriving: How Electricity Changed Rural New Hampshire Life." During the first half of the 20th century in New Hampshire, residents of developed communities enjoyed the transformative benefits of electric power, while those in the sparsely populated regions lived and worked in conditions little changed from the 19th century. It took the coming of the New Deal's Rural Electrification Administration and a determined band of farmers to overcome opposition from the established private utilities to create the New Hampshire Electric Cooperative in 1939. Despite labor and material shortages during World War II, within a decade, power came to almost all of the previously unserved areas of the state. This program will explore how these developments changed civic and social life in New Hampshire's countryside, and touch upon the ways the disparity of broadband access in the state today echoes these earlier struggles. This New Hampshire Humanities program is co-hosted with the Windham Historical Society.

Steve Taylor is a farmer, newspaperman, and longtime public official. He has studied, written, and spoken for many years about New Hampshire's rural culture and the state's agricultural history. With his three sons, he operates a livestock and maple farm in Meriden Village. He has been a newspaper reporter and editor and was founding executive director of the New Hampshire Humanities Council. He served 25 years as the state's commissioner of agriculture.

Seeing more birds than you ever imagined and witnessing exciting avian drama is possible, whether you're on the go or in your own neighborhood, local park, or backyard. As Heather explains, it all comes down to how you tune in to the show happening around you, the one in which birds - highly skilled at staying under the radar — are the stars. Heather will share her very best tactics and the jaw-dropping photographs they helped her capture. This virtual program is presented in conjunction with Ashland (Mass.) Public Library.



Heather Wolf is the author of *Find More Birds* and *Birding at the Bridge*. A Brooklyn-based birder, photographer, and educator, she works with the Cornell Lab of Ornithology as a web developer, teaches birding classes at Brooklyn Botanic Garden, and gives walks and talks for various organizations in New York City and beyond.


