Community Events



Suffrage Song: The Haunted History of Gender, Race, and Voting Rights in the U.S.



Join us virtually via Zoom on Monday, June 10 at 7:00 p.m., when New Yorker contributing cartoonist Caitlin Cass traces the fight for suffrage in the U.S. from the 1848 Seneca Falls Convention to the Voting Rights Act of 1965 in her new book, Suffrage Song The Haunted History of Gender, Race and Voting Rights in the U.S. Part graphic novel, part map of the suffrage movement, Caitlin's book tells the story of the fight for the right to vote by women from the very beginning, touching on the suffrage movement's triumphs, setbacks, and problematic aspects. 

Originally from River Forest, Illinois, Caitlin spent 11 years in Buffalo, N.Y., and recently moved west to teach as Assistant Professor of Studio Art, Illustration and Time-Based Media at the University of Nebraska Omaha.

Why We Read




This one is for readers everywhere! Join us virtually via Zoom on Thursday, June 13 at 7:00 p.m. when we'll be chatting with author Shannon Reed about her book, Why We Read: On Bookworms, Libraries, and Just One Page Before Lights Out. Why DO we read? What compels us to read? What holds our attention? And how many of us remember reading by a flashlight after hours? Shannon will have the scoop and will be answering lots of our questions! She makes the case that we should read for pleasure

above all else. In this whip-smart, laugh-out-loud funny collection, she shares surprising stories from her life as a reader and the poignant ways in which books have impacted her students. This program is presented with Ashland (Mass.) Public Library.

Shannon grew up in Johnstown. Pennsylvania, and lived in Brooklyn for 14 years, where she taught high school English and Theatre. In 2012, she began studying with the Writing Program at the University of Pittsburgh, where she completed an MFA in Creative Writing (Fiction) in 2015. She joined the faculty shortly thereafter and is now the Director of Undergraduate Studies for the Writing Program in the University of Pittsburgh, as well as a Teaching Associate Professor, specializing in fiction and humor writing courses. Shannon lives in a small town just outside Pittsburgh, and she is ceaselessly interested in talking about herself and her work, so don't hesitate to get in touch via SReed151 @gmail.com.

Shannon's first book, Why Did I Get a B?: And Other Mysteries We're Discussing in the Faculty Lounge, was a semi-finalist for the Thurber Prize in American Humor. Her second, Why We Read: On Bookworms, Libraries, and Just One More Page Before Lights Out, was published on February 6, 2024. It's a Next Big Idea Club Must-Read Pick!

The Book-Makers



Books have transformed humankind by enabling authors to create, document, and entertain. Yet we know little about the individuals who brought these fascinating objects into existence and of those who first experimented in the art of printing, design. and binding. Who were the renegade book-makers who changed the course of history? We will help answer that question on Tuesday, June 18 at 10:00 a.m. when author Adam Smyth joins us virtually via Zoom to talk about this topic so close to our hearts. Adam's new book, The Book-Makers: A History of the Book in Eighteen Lives. tells of the 500-year history of printed books through the people who created them. This program is presented with the Ashland (Mass.) Public Library.

Adam Smyth is professor of English literature and the history of the book at Balliol College, Oxford University. He works on the connections between literature and material texts, particularly in the 16th and 17th centuries, but also more widely. He is the author of four books and the editor or co-editor of four collections of essays. Adam is a founding member of the 39 Steps Press printing collective, based in a barn in Oxfordshire. He co-hosts the literary podcast, and sometime radio show, LitBits. He writes regularly for the London Review of Books.

Walking Gourmet Food Truck is a Windham-based culinary kitchen-on-wheels earning a Viewers' Choice




Teen Happenings




